At Bible study we were looking at the coming season of Advent and discussing how we can use this time of waiting for the coming of Jesus to earth at Christmas to consider if we are ready for Him, on a daily basis.

As wardens we are working to make the building fit and in good order for the day. The lightning conductor has been serviced and safety ensured. The statue of St John, sited on the northwest corner of the tower, has had a repair carried out to the statue platform, as highlighted in the quinquennial inspection. While access was available to the statue Bennetts also gave the statue two coats of preservative, it looks great.

The resurfacing of the south entrance to the church is giving a better journey to the church for those who use walking aids as well as wheelchair users. Thank you all for your patience during the time the work was being carried out.

The bigger repairs are obvious but many minor repairs go on as and when the need occurs. They give the church a well ordered, cared for feel and all the above give hope for the time we are in and the time to come for the future of St John's in this parish. We have cause to be very grateful to members past and present for their generosity which enables the parish to stay relevant (and solvent!) in these times.

We do not know when Our Lord will return but we can be happy that the building will stand firm in this community to remind all that we are here and not going anywhere soon. For the people who do gather, there will be more guidance on making ourselves ready for the Advent of Our King.



A New Year

'How appropriate' I said when I discovered the date of Fr Tim's birthday - St Cecilia's Day. Not very much is known about this saint. She was born into an aristocratic family, lived in Rome, and is thought to have been put to death because she was a Christian sometime towards the end of the 2nd century. She is the patron saint of musicians - which is why I said 'How appropriate' when I discovered Fr Tim's birthday date. Cecilia was probably adopted by musicians as their patron saint because of a story which tells how as music was played at her wedding she 'sang in her heart to the Lord'. In art she is usually portrayed with an organ or organ pipes in her hand. St Cecilia devoted her life to telling people about Jesus and bringing them to faith. Indeed, the first converts she made were her husband and his brother. All three of them eventually died as martyrs.

Music has always played a significant part in Christian worship. In one of his sermons St Augustine reminds us of a verse in Psalm 33, 'Sing to the Lord a new song', and encourages us to sing as we pray and worship. And in another sermon he tells us that 'amidst the dangers and the trials we must sing Alleluia'. 'Sing as travellers sing along the road' says Augustine. 'Sing up - and keep on walking'.

St Cecilia's feast is celebrated in the second part of November. That is when our Church year is drawing towards its close; when the days are getting progressively shorter and darker; and we have even darker days to look forward to as December progresses. So perhaps it's a time of year when we need to be reminded that if in our hearts we can 'sing joyfully to the Lord' (and we don't need wonderfully trained voices that bring pleasure to the human ear!) then the joy of our faith will shine more brightly through our daily lives. And wouldn't it be wonderful if through us and our example of joyful faith God would use us, as he used St Cecilia, to bring another person to faith in his Son.

Our Church year is coming to an end. But without a pause a new year will begin. What do you expect? 'Same old, same old' say some, the glass-half-empty brigade. But that can't be the Christian's reply, surely. A <u>new</u> year. So for the Christian something to embrace with joy, anticipation, excitement even. For the new year begins with Advent, the season when day by day (the Advent calendar warns us) our celebration of the birth of Jesus is coming close ('coming *close*' is what the word 'advent' means).

There's lots of music in Advent. My regular supermarket shop (usually quiet apart from the occasional request for Jean or Gary to 'come to customer services') is accompanied by popular Christmas music, even some carols. Scrooge-like I mutter and scowl. But should I? Maybe hearing 'Away in a manger' will remind someone scurrying towards the check-outs that Christmas is about the greatest gift God has given to his children, the gift of his Son. And maybe, even, nudge him / her towards a church on Christmas Day.

That Son's birth was accompanied by music - the music of heaven. Frightened shepherds heard the singing of angel voices, and having heard it had the courage to 'go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened'. In the darkness there was dazzling light, the light of God's love breaking through the sadness and sins of the world. Instead of fear there was joy, the joy of God-with-us.

Can we, this Advent and in the new year it begins, as we continue our journey along the road which is our life on earth, do less than obey the instruction of St Augustine to sing (in our hearts); and whatever lies ahead in the new year with which Advent begins, faithfully and joyfully 'keep on walking' the path the Lord sets before us. Walking? The shepherds didn't leave it at that. They 'hurried away', got to Bethlehem and its stable as quickly as they could. May we find that urgency this Advent: like Cecilia to share our faith with others; and like shepherds to know the joy of meeting the Lord, not as they did in Bethlehem 'the house of bread', but in the bread of the Eucharist which strengthens us to walk, to sing, to live, and to work to his praise and glory.

Cuppa and Chat with Deacon Rachel ~ Gena Lambert

Gena was born in 1932 in Watford, the first of three daughters. Her parents wanted to call her Georgina but her Grandmother didn't approve so as a compromise they chose 'Gena' - short for nothing!!

Gena was so put out by the arrival of a new sister and protested by starving herself! When her parents consulted the doctor about this he said, wisely, 'put the food in front of her, she will eat when she gets hungry'. How right he was! Soon after this Gena started attending the kindergarten just up the road which was run by an aunt.

Gena remained there until she went to Watford Girls'
Grammar School. During the Second World War she and her sisters moved to their grandmother's house as their family home was in the path of would-be bombers. She remembers being accompanied by an older girl from their school. She remained there through to the sixth form and studied English, Geography, Art and French.

Gena knew from an early age that she wanted to be a nurse, and achieving this wasn't without its struggles. In her earlier childhood it was discovered that she had the same heart condition as her father, but this didn't hold her back. So Gena attended a nursing cadet college which was attached to the Grammar School. At one point she was ushered to the back of the auditorium by the Headmistress as she had turned up wearing her blue and white striped cadet uniform.

She enrolled in the Middlesex Hospital Nursing School, where she gained State Registered Nurse status. She also completed the Hospital Certificate. Gena had met Donald her husband during a stay with Aunts in Ferring when he was serving as curate at St Andrew's Clifton Road, and their relationship grew during her nurses training.

They got married in St John's Church, Watford in 1955 and after a brief honeymoon in Brockenhurst they flew out to Nassau in the Bahamas where Donald was serving as a priest. The parish had kindly spruced up the vicarage in readiness for their arrival. Their first daughter, Frances, was born there but sadly they had to return home sooner than they had hoped after a home invasion at gunpoint, the shock from which they never really recovered.

Donald served as parish priest initially in Bathwick; during this time that they were gifted with four more daughters. They moved to a few other parishes before eventually retiring to Worthing where they were given a house large enough for their family for a 'peppercorn' rent. Gena then worked as a district nurse in the Shoreham area. During this time she and another nurse were asked to set up a 'Terminal Care Service' which became the community palliative care team with their own specialist doctor. Gena finally retired when she was 66 which enabled her to care for Donald whose health was failing.

Gena's first experience of church was her Baptism and then being sent to Sunday School. She remembers times when the weather was so inclement that their dad would put a coat on over his pyjamas and take them to church. At her Confirmation, unlike her friend who had a new dress and shoes, Gena had to wear her mother's off-white tennis dress and her black school shoes. When she was training as a nurse, she would either attend the chapel service in the hospital or go to Mass at All Saints, Margaret Street.

When the 'Lamberts' eventually moved to Worthing they first attended St Andrew's, Tarring, where Gena assisted in chauffeuring folk to and from church. Donald was the first to move to St John's and Gena followed on once her duties as driver were no longer required, and she fully entered into the life of the congregation and parish.

Gena's favourites: she often returns to 'Under Milkwood' which was a set book when she studied A Level English in her forties. She enjoys listening to classical music and plays both the piano and flute. For relaxation she watches programmes like the Repair Shop and Escape to the Country. Gena's favourite tipple is 'Baileys' which as a treat she'll have in coffee! When it comes to food, definitely not fish but her sweet tooth always leads her to Banoffee Pie. She looks back on her holiday with Donald to New Zealand fondly, the scenery was just spectacular. She also remembers beach holidays with the girls with joy – watching Donald helping them build the most wonderful sandcastles.

Gena now enjoys keeping up with the lives of her five girls, ten grandchildren and fourteen great-grandchildren.

Thank you Gena for sharing your story with us - and this only a vignette of your life!

The cost is £15 per entry.


