

Autumn

Harvest is upon us as we move into post summer period with Harvest Supper planned for Saturday 5th October.

September has kicked off early with our first PCC since this time of interregnum. The Archdeacon joined us, first to say Mass and then to address the PCC on the outlook for St John's, as we wait and pray for a new priest to be our leader and guide.

Keeping our eyes on the road ahead and getting repairs and seasonal chores attended to is simple good practice. We have a book on it, it's quite scary noting all that must be done as well as all that should be done... but we push forward because we love the building and the worship and being here together.

If it hasn't already happened, you will soon be enjoying a new path to the church from Elm Grove. We were delayed a bit when Alan, our treasurer, ended up in hospital with pneumonia last July! This caused a delay in delegating the funds to pay for the repair.

During August, the organ and the piano were tuned and the clock was serviced; the hour chime now occurs on the hour rather than 3 minutes before, which made the time of start of services a bit misleading.

We have seen new faces this summer which always cheers the heart and may our prayers for growth continue throughout the interregnum. The Vicarage is being prepared to be let for a minimum time of one year. This may seem like looking at the oncoming winter with spring feeling a long way off. But winter always has the benefit of closing the curtains, getting the winter duvet out and, for some, sitting by an open fire. In winter the church celebrates the season of Advent, a time of waiting, which leads to the joyful Christmas celebration of the Lord's birth. The interregnum can be a time of faith and growing in strength as we wait for a new incumbent. Each week as we come to worship, we have so much to give thanks to God for. St John's is rich in worship, warmth and welcome; we have been given Fr Roger and Deacon Rachel to look after us. Believe it or not we are growing in number! We do not need to wait for the next incumbent to keep the home fires of worship, warmth and welcome burning. We do not need to wait for the next incumbent to arrive to grow in number. In faith we are praying and thanking God, who is, we believe, preparing and calling the next priest to continue to build on what we already have here. In the meantime, add another prayer of faith: that God will bring more people to worship him here and rejoice with us in his many blessings as we see the congregation grow.

Cuppa and Chat with Deacon Rachel ~ Hannah Burke

Hannah was born in 2008 in Worthing Hospital and welcomed by her brother and sister David and Kerys. Her early years were spent in Worthing before moving to Angmering.

Hannah's early education was at the St John's Preschool and Goring C of E Primary School. Her secondary education has been at St Oscar Romero which she has really enjoyed, specifically because of the Christian ethos. The change of name from Chatsmore was a decision made by the whole school body, and each year there is a whole school celebration on his Feast Day. Oscar Romero was Archbishop of San Salvador and was shot dead whilst saying Mass on 24th April 1980. Hannah had just received her GCSE results when we had our cuppa and chat and she was so pleased with her results. In addition to English, Maths and Geography. Hannah studied Food Tech, Drama and Dance.

She was overwhelmed when her teacher told her how moved she was by her solo dance which was to 'Lovely' by Billie Eilish. Hannah is delighted to be able to continue her 6th Form studies at the new 6th Form department at St Oscar Romero and will be studying Criminology, Health and Social Studies and Drama.

The medals in this photo are from dancing, her great love. She began dancing soon after she was able to walk. She was enrolled in the Suzanne Logan School of Dance when she was very young. Her first solo dance was from the Teddy Bear Ballet. From there she went from strength



to strength and has earned medals at the All England Finals and the Dance World Cup finals. She was able to go to Portugal for a dance competition and enjoyed not only seeing part of the country but also meeting young people from other countries. She was due to attend a championship in Rome and was so disappointed when this was cancelled due to the Covid 19 pandemic. The effects of the pandemic gave Hannah quite a knock, and she lost confidence in doing solo dances. However, recently she danced at the 100 anniversary of the Brighton Dance Festival which took place at Glyndebourne which focussed on the evolution of dance.

Despite the busy-ness of school and dancing Hannah finds time to look after her pet dog 'Bingo' and her cat 'Princess Poppy'. She and Kerys are hoping that Hiccup (Kerys's dog) will begin training as an assistance dog.

Hannah's favourites. Her favourite drink is Sprite 0 and her favourite food is Sushi which she proudly told me she had made for the practical in the Food Tech GCSE; making sushi is quite a feat. The book she remembers well is The Umbrella Academy by Gerard Way. Hannah has a broad taste in music which perhaps comes from dancing. She enjoys listening to ballads. When reflecting on her favourite holiday, Hannah thought that in the future she would love to go to Antarctica or somewhere really cold as she doesn't enjoy the hot weather.

St John's has been part of Hannah's life since she was a baby and there is a lovely photo of Hannah, her brother and sister in their cassock and cottas taken after Mass. Hannah was the boat-girl (carrying the incense boat). She went to Eagles, Survivors and has been on a Walsingham Pilgrimage. She talked about how important her faith is to her, and feels it has grown over the last year or so. The Christian ethos at school has been part of this journey and during her GCSE years she has found comfort and strength knowing that God is with her.

Thank you, Hannah, for sharing your story so far and in the immortal words of 'Strictly Come Dancing' - keep dancing!!

Our Sense of Gratitude

'Farmers are facing a harvest washout' I read the other day. And learned that yield forecasts for wheat, barley, oats and oilseed rape will be the third worst since 1983. Then on another day last week I was warned that, due to a nationwide shortage, carrots will become considerably more expensive within the next few weeks. The problem: heavy rain earlier in the year which led to crops rotting in flooded fields; and milder weather which meant more pests and diseases. So does all that dampen our spirits or change our focus as we observe our traditional harvest festival? Probably not. Because unless you are someone who has a daily craving for large quantities of carrots, the price and availability of the other crops I read about is unlikely to impinge too much, if at all, on our day-to-day shopping, cooking and feeding. So what's this annual festival, or more accurately act of thanksgiving, all about in this day and age and in our urban setting?

One of Charles Dickens's characters, travelling snugly inside a carriage while others shivered on the outside, remarks: If everyone were warm and well-fed, we should lose the satisfaction of admiring the fortitude with which certain conditions of men bear cold and hunger. And if we were no better off than anybody else, what would become of our sense of gratitude, which is one of the holiest feelings of our common nature.

A parody, perhaps. But it makes me think of the parable Jesus told about the Pharisee and the tax collector: the one standing proudly in the Temple and praying 'I thank you, God, that I am not like other men'; the other in a quiet corner, eyes closed and downcast, asking 'God be merciful to me, a sinner'.

Dickens's character prides himself on what he calls 'one of the holiest feelings of our common nature' - our feeling of thankfulness. At harvest festival time perhaps our thankfulness focuses, consciously or unconsciously, on this: that unlike so many men, women and children in the world we are well and easily fed, well-nourished, and (even without the heating allowance) kept reasonably warm. Can that give us, perhaps, a satisfying glow of comfort, thanksgiving that 'we are not like other men'. Or does it - should it - tear at our compassion for those who day by day really do struggle literally to keep body and soul together.

And not only people in places far away, places we know about only by seeing them on television reports, and even then only for a few days while the plight of those who are starving or forced from their homes by natural or man-made disasters is news-worthy; but, if we care (or dare) to look, on our own doorstep.

So, this year's harvest appeal - for support via Turning Tides for those in our own community who really do struggle day by day to feed, clothe and warm themselves. Yes, we should give thanks for the blessings which are ours. But in humility and real concern for those in need. For in them we are called to see the face of Jesus himself.

St John the Divine and St Andrew the Apostle Walsingham Pilgrimage

St Maximilian Kolbe wrote, 'We should let ourselves be guided and led by Mary and rest quiet and secure in her hands', words to hold on our hearts as we began our Pilgrimage to Walsingham.

Eight pilgrims gathered at St John's on Friday 2nd August for Mass and the Blessing of Pilgrims, setting the scene for the pilgrimage – travelling, praying and being together. Phil Ashton took the wheel for the first leg of the journey which gave Deacon Rachel time to chat to

us about the pilgrimage and what our joint intention might be. We agreed that it would be an opportunity to pray for our parishes as we await the arrival of our new priest.

Deacon Rachel took the wheel as we left Birchanger after a break for lunch and on our arrival at Walsingham we were greeted by the ninth member of the pilgrim-



age, Fr David Mumford newly retired to Worthing living in Ramsey Hall.

Having received the keys to our rooms we went to the Shrine Church for the First Visit which began in the Annunciation Chapel and having heard the account of the Annunciation we walked into the Holy House, the subdued lighting, flickering candles and the eyes of Our Lady looking to her Son drew us all into the welcome and hospitality of the Shrine

Three pilgrims had not been to Walsingham and these are their reflections.

Madeleine:

I felt quite anxious at first not knowing what to expect. However, I was pleasantly surprised to see such a beautiful place within a vast woodland countryside.

People in the group were very friendly and kind. I was led to a large bedroom, airy and bright overlooking the garden. I felt so lucky. The day began with prayers before breakfast. We had full days of worship, rituals and ceremonies in different chapels. On Saturday evening we had a candle lit procession singing hymns while walking through the garden amongst ornamental flower beds and trees. It was magical. I felt so at peace and also full of vitality, despite the long day. I enjoyed sitting in the garden meditating on the sermons I heard. I remember one particularly about 'the gap' as on the London Underground. This comparison which cleverly made by the priest reminds me to keep close to God as much as possible. He is forever present in my daily life offering peace, tranquillity and love. It was a mini holiday among likeminded friends in the presence of God and the Virgin Mary.

The cost is £15 per entry.


