

## Cuppa and a Chat with Deacon Rachel ~ Rosemary Stock



Rosemary was born in Adelaide, Australia in 1953, where along with her sister she went to school. After school she went to university in Adelaide studied French and Spanish and then completed a postgraduate diploma in teaching after which she was posted to a shipbuilding and steelworks town to teach modern languages.

Looking back, she reflected on the community culture in which she grew up. She

had three families, her 'kin', neighbours, and church, and all played an important part in nurturing and encouraging her. She was baptised and confirmed at St Columba's where she taught in the Sunday School, attended the Junior Fellowship and then the Young Anglican Fellowship. Her early memory of church is kneeling on the floor, resting on the pew and colouring in Bible stories.



Rosemary enjoyed teaching, but .... there was something missing. So, on 13<sup>th</sup> December 1976 she embarked on her 'big adventure', the first stage being in the UK. After only a few days she knew she had 'come home', and what was intended to be a year-long adventure became her new 'life'.

First, she visited places in the UK and then she headed off to Spain for a month. She noticed how concerned the locals were for her safety, to the point of checking she was okay when a young American man joined her at the table and the waiters quickly came over to check that she wasn't being 'bothered'. Her funniest memory was, having been up in the mountains to watch the Flamenco dancers, she stopped for a drink in a bar. Suddenly the door opened, and in came an elderly man followed by his donkey!! No-one batted an eyelid. Eventually they explained that the donkey was there to ensure he got home safely after a few!!

Returning to the UK she bought a car and tent and headed off for a three month trip around Europe. There were always three of them, though the companions changed enroute. She was struck by the architecture, the combination of light and dark. She would always make time to visit the local churches and cathedrals.

Then the time came for her to get a job. First temping in Harrods, then packing up Bibles to be sent abroad on behalf of a charity, and then what became her career in media. I am going to leave the details about Rosemary's career for the book which she is going to write! She was highly respected in her field and towards the end of her career became a lobbyist. She would smile to herself as she walked through Parliament looking at the visitors queuing, thinking 'I'm here for a meeting'.

Rosemary's favourite food is all things chocolate and her favourite drink is Rosé wine. When it comes to books she has 'catholic' taste – crime, history, whodunnits and .... She enjoys listening to classical and choral music and also 60's pop music. Her hobbies are crocheting, embroidery, counted cross-stitch and reading.

Wherever Rosemary has lived she has endeavoured to make her spiritual home in a church near to her home. So, when she arrived in Worthing, she found St John's, was warmly welcomed and soon made close friends with members of the congregation. Now she is a welcomer, and extends that same love and welcome to newcomers. The sacramental worship at St John's sustains and nourishes her throughout the week. Rosemary shared two events in her life which had a profound effect on her spiritual life. One was attending the Passion Play at Oberammergau and the other the Life of Christ at Wintershall.

Thank you, Rosemary, for sharing your 'big adventure' with us – we look forward to reading about your career.

### A Recipe for Happiness

When I was Fr Beau's curate in Brighton we used to meet in church at 8.15 for the Morning Office and a time of prayer (Mass was usually later in the day). On my way home I would call in at the newspaper shop and pick up my copy of The Times. If I was lucky when I got home I could spend a few minutes reading it. Sometimes it would remain unopened all day. So one of the things I value now that I am 'retired' is having time each day (most days / some days!) to enjoy my newspaper, and quite often as I read I am able to broaden my education.

So it was that one day recently I came across a brief report from which I learned that cooking and eating was not merely a matter of survival even 6,000 years ago: as far back as that people were using spices that had no nutritional value, but which, they had discovered, made their food more enjoyable, and maybe their hard lives a little happier.

I might have overlooked that snippet of information had it not been that my attention had been drawn to a short article printed alongside it which also contained some interesting facts: 'Too much religion can harm a society's economy by undermining the drive for financial success.' That was what the first paragraph told me. 'Here we go again' I growled; 'someone having another go at the Church.' You know as well as I do that it is almost always the case that when 'news' is reported, it is the bad news that grabs the headlines. But in this case it wasn't all bad: there was good news too. It came in the second paragraph, where I read that the same survey (of nearly 190,000 people, so quite a comprehensive one) suggested that 'Poor people can be happy with their lack of material wealth if they have religion.' And when it went on to give more details of the survey's findings I discovered that not only were 'poor believers happier than poor atheists', but even that 'some religious people ....... were happiest when their income was low.'

That wasn't the only piece of 'religious' news that day. I also read about an atheist would-be volunteer Girl Guide leader who said she felt she had been forced out of the unit because the leader was insisting on keeping to the 'old' Guide Promise which included the commitment to 'love God'. And there was another article which criticised a bishop for his long held and stated view that fracking and the extraction of shale gas could pose risks to God's creation, of which mankind is called to be the steward

No surprise in any of this: Jesus himself warned his followers that the Good News of God's Kingdom would attract hostility, criticism and ridicule from many people. But that day, informed and educated by the newspaper that has been part of my life for many years, I for one was more than happy to be counted amongst the 'poor believers'. The challenge for the believer (rich or poor) is to *be* happy - and to show it!

### MY VERY FIRST CAMPING TRIP

I have never, in my 75 years, been camping and slept in a tent. I have been glamping but never camping so when my son asked me if I would like to join him and his extended family, two sisters and brothers-in-law, father-in-law, a friend, 10 children with ages ranging from 5 to 21, on a camping trip to Bala in North Wales, how could I possibly refuse.

Three of us left home at 12.30pm in the Land Rover laden with camping gear towing a sailing boat trailer also laden with camping gear plus a kayak and a roof box. It was a long 7 hour journey and my daughter-in-law did a good job driving all the way there without a stop (apart from a very early visit to the petrol station, boat in tow, as we only had 55 miles of fuel in the tank).

We arrived at the camp site at 7.30pm and promptly erected our tent which had inflatable poles so the job was done very quickly with a lot of help.

My son, who had driven up separately, arrived about an hour after us with the rest of the gear, his bike and my grandson. The bar-b-que was lit and burgers and sausages were cooked for dinner and very nice they were too. A campfire was lit down by the lake where we all sat and talked, maybe drank a little while the children toasted marshmallows. We went to bed at about 11pm. We were only talking but apparently there had been two complaints that we were making too much noise.

Bedtime was the bit I was not looking forward to. I did have a nice comfortable bed but what if I wanted to go to the loo during the night! We were furthest away from the toilet block so I didn't fancy walking there on my own even if I did have a torch, I would just have to hold on until it was light. It turns out the toilet situation was the least of my problems as I snore during the night and I try to avoid sleeping in the same room as other people.

I was sharing the tent with my son, his wife and my grandson - there are three separate compartments - my son constantly nudged me during the night to stop me snoring so we all had a very disturbed night. Little did I know how bad my snoring was until I got home and downloaded a snoring app on my phone. I have to say I was shocked at my snoring decibels and am surprised I didn't keep the whole campsite awake.

I eventually got up at 5am when it was light and went to the loo. I got my chair and stayed outside the tent watching the sunrise and getting bitten by midges until other people got up 2 hours later.

The showers were very good and I had a shower before breakfast. The ladies cooked bacon, sausage and eggs which were put into rolls and they were delicious. I tried to do my part by doing the washing up which was a bit of a chore with 19 people but one of the men also helped with this task. We had to take it up to the toilet block where there were sinks set aside for washing up. I went up to the toilet block, for various reasons, 6 times a day and was able to achieve my 5000 daily steps doing this alone.

After breakfast we went down to the lake where the children put on wet suits and life jackets, the lake was very cold. They either swam, sailed, kayaked or paddle boarded. It was so lovely watching them all enjoying themselves and getting on so well together, the older ones looking out for the younger ones. There were no tears, arguing or tantrums for the whole time we were there. My brother and his wife and family, who were also holidaying in Bala, came to visit and their 27 year old son desperately wanted to go in the lake for a swim but had no swimmers with him so stripped down to his undies and dived in, much to the shock and amusement of all who watched him.

We had sunny weather for the four days we were there which made a lot of difference. The group had been going to this camp site for 9 years and could not remember having such good weather before. Had it not been sunny then I would not have gone out on the sailing boat.

The lake was beautifully calm, the sun was shining but there was enough wind to sail, we even got the spinnaker out. It was a memorable experience.

One of the girls had just had her 18<sup>th</sup> Birthday so we decorated the gazebo and ordered in her choice of a Chinese takeaway followed by a Birthday Cake to celebrate. We then lit a fire down by the lake and all sat around this talking, toasting marshmallows and maybe drinking a little but only until 10pm as we didn't want to disturb the other campers again.

I had a good night's sleep that night so assumed that I didn't snore but apparently I did and they just didn't wake me so they had a poor night again. I did offer to go sleep in the one man tent but they wouldn't let me do that.

I got up again about 5am and sat outside until the others woke up. At 7am the sun was shining but by 8am a mist had come down but it soon disappeared and another lovely day ensued.

We spent the day again down by the lake with the children doing their water sports, it was lovely seeing the 5 year old sitting on the front of the paddle board with her 18 year old cousin paddling her around the lake and the 10 year old really getting to grips with kayaking. The wind was very light today so not a particularly good day for sailing although both boats went out.





One of the families had brought their pizza oven and had made pizza dough during the day so we all had pizza for dinner with a choice of our own toppings, I just had cheese on mine. They were really nice. While sitting in the gazebo after dinner the owner of the site came down on his cycle carrying a tray on the handlebars containing 19 ice creams of various flavours which grandad had organised for all of us. That was a real treat and appreciated by all.

We again sat around the camp fire down by the lake where we talked, maybe drank a little and toasted marshmallows until we went to bed about 10pm. A fairly good night for me but not the others! We had to be off the site by 11am on the last day so a lot of packing up had to be done and we were ready to leave by 11.

We arrived home at about 4.30pm having had one stop for a quick bite to eat on the way.

I really enjoyed the experience and yes I would do it again with the proviso that I slept on my own for everyone's benefit.

The cost is £15 per entry.


