The July Message

Finding Light in Everyday Moments

In the midst of our busy lives, it's easy to rush past the quiet gifts that each day offers. The warmth of morning sunlight, a kind word from a friend, or that peaceful moment when we finally sit down at the end of the day—these simple experiences often hold more meaning than we realise. Our faith reminds us that God's presence isn't limited to church walls or formal worship, but flows through the ordinary moments of our daily routines. When we take time to notice these small graces, we begin to see how the sacred touches every part of our lives.

Learning to recognise these everyday blessings can make a real difference in how we navigate both good times and challenges. A shared meal with family becomes deeper communion, giving someone a hand feels like true worship, and even our difficulties can become opportunities for growth and stronger faith. As a parish community, we can support each other in staying alert to these daily encounters with grace. Sometimes the most meaningful conversations happen when we share how we've noticed God working in the ordinary moments of our week, reminding each other that we're never truly alone in our journey.

Consider how you feel after reading the article above and hold on to that feeling.

The buzz in the news over the last year or so has been AI (artificial intelligence). While AI is artificial it's not actually intelligent, it just very knowledgeable, which as you are aware isn't the same thing. However what would you think if I told you the two paragraphs above were completely written by AI? Would it change the way you 'feel' about it, would you even reject it knowing it wasn't written by a person? Is the sentiment right? For someone in full time work with many other responsibilities I do need to remind myself of the small wins in life.

Prayer and Love

The primary social message of Christianity is best conveyed in prayer; prayer is more powerful than preaching. We express our love for God by praying to Him; we express our love of other human beings by praying for them. When we pray to God, we improve our relationship with Him, and feel closer to Him. When we pray for other people we may, as Christians believe, be giving them spiritual support. We certainly improve our own attitude towards them. Anyone who has ever prayed for a supposed enemy knows that the sense of hostility melts like a snowman on a summer day. The central function of all the Christian churches is prayer; that is a way of binding human beings together by the power of love.

Those are not the words of a famous theologian, or of a spiritual ‘guru’, but a quotation from an article by a religious affairs correspondent in a newspaper - perhaps not the first place you would naturally look for words of wisdom! Aware of the many forces which assail the practice and teaching of Christian faith these days, its subject was ‘the re-conversion of England’. And how right the writer is when he says that that process must begin with a realisation on the part of every practising Christian that prayer must be the foundation of their lives and the springboard of their every action.

Prayer is an expression of love, the writer says; and, arguably, the overriding reason why the Church expanded, spread, flourished in its early years was that Christians in community were notable for the love they had for each other; they stood out from the crowd; and as a result they attracted others into the community of faith.

In the last of his *Four Quartets* T S Eliot describes the church at Little Gidding where, in the 17th century, Nicholas Ferrar and his family kept a regular pattern of prayer. Eliot says:

*You are not here to verify,
Instruct yourself, or inform curiosity
Or carry report. You are here to kneel
Where prayer has been valid.*

The first thing I notice when I visit a church I haven’t been into before isn’t anything significant about its architecture or its furnishings, it’s how it feels - and I’m not talking here about temperature. If the Blessed Sacrament is reserved there you can feel it even before you have seen the tabernacle or aumbry with its curtain and light. And by the way it feels you can tell whether it is a church that is prayed in.

It is not unusual for visitors to comment about St John's that 'there is a special atmosphere' about the church. And I reply, 'Yes, because it is a church that is prayed in.' But it could be prayed in more!! Read again the words of the newspaper columnist: *The central function of all the Christian churches is prayer; that is a way of binding human beings together by the power of love.*

Day by day there is the opportunity to join with others here in the prayer offered by the Church, in this expression of love. To follow the example, and to join a long procession of people who have prayed here as the Mass has been offered faithfully day after day, year after year.

Those to whom we look for leadership, and especially our bishops, need our prayers. Our brothers and sisters (those we know and love, those unknown, and those we find hard to get on with) need our prayers. Those who have turned away from Christ and those who have never come to faith need our prayers. And we ourselves *need* to pray - for God has created us to live in a relationship of love with him, a love which finds its first and ultimate expression in the prayer of thanksgiving and adoration we must offer each day.

Make the most of the opportunity that is offered as the Eucharist is celebrated here each day; join in prayer with others and express your love for God and for your brothers and sisters. And so build up this community as one of love - love that will attract others into it.

The second half of the year begins on 1st July: so a 'new half-year resolution' - to consider the ways in which *you* might pray more regularly, and offer prayer support to your brothers and sisters, in a place where, to quote T S Eliot, 'prayer has been valid'.

Cuppa and Chat with Deacon Rachel

In 2026 Malcolm and Anita Strudwick will celebrate their 60th Wedding Anniversary. They met in Worthing and were married at St Mary's Goring when Anita was 20 and Malcolm 18. They have two children. Their son lives in their family home in Bruce Avenue, and their daughter lives next door. Their family has now grown to include four grandchildren.



Anita was born in 1945 in Worthing and grew up in Maybridge with her two sisters. Sadly, one of her sisters died very soon after she was born. After she left school she worked for Lacey's, a printing company in Worthing.

Malcolm was born in 1947 in Elm Grove, Worthing. He and his two brothers and sister were the third generation to live in the house (a well-established family you might say). The family were regular members of the congregation at St John's and his father was Verger for nearly 40 years. There is a plaque in the pulpit in memory of him and his service to the parish. Malcolm recalled his early years as a server, beginning as a 'boat boy'. Later on he joined the choir, where he became head chorister. Anita says even now he is always singing as he potters around their home.

From a very young age Malcolm had wanted to be a blacksmith, but when the time came for him to apply for an apprenticeship the only blacksmith in Worthing had just taken on a new boy. Sadly, he had to look elsewhere for a job. So he worked with cars, and became adept as a panel beater. However, he never really felt fulfilled in his work.

Malcolm was asked to help with the Scouts and this became a lasting interest for 40 years. He was so disappointed when he had to finally give up. He remembers the last time he went camping with them and described how difficult it was to stand up having secured all the guy ropes!

It was soon after their 25th Wedding Anniversary that Malcolm, whilst on a scout camp, heard about Anita's stroke. They speak warmly of the way she was treated at the Atkinson Morley and Worthing Hospitals.

It was a privilege for them to be able to raise funds for both hospitals in recognition of all their kindness, care and compassion.

Soon after her stroke Fr Keith encouraged Anita to be prepared for Confirmation and she was confirmed by Bishop Eric. They regularly attended St John's together until recently. When Malcolm had to give up the car they now receive holy communion regularly at home. He is now to be seen 'racing' up and down Goring Road and along the sea front on his scooter. And still to St John's on some Sunday mornings.

Malcolm and Anita's favourites:

Food – Anita's favourite is Fish and Chips and Malcolm's is a good roast dinner.

Drink – In her younger years Anita enjoyed a Whiskey Mac but now she sticks to her cranberry juice. Malcolm's is a lager! In fact, their daughter had just bought him a presentation pack of two bottles and a glass of an Italian lager!

Book – Anita used to enjoy reading but finds it a struggle now and Malcolm is not so keen on reading.

TV – Loose Women is Anita's favourite programme and Malcolm watches Nature programmes. As someone whose hobby was photography he marvels at the patience of cameramen who wait for hours/days for just the right shot.

Music – They both like 50's and 60's music and can often be heard singing along to their favourite songs, although Anita says that she can't sing!

Hobbies – Over the years Malcolm has done quite a lot of watercolour painting, gardening and photography. Often when I visit, he is sitting at the table either building Lego or making pictures with beads.

Holidays – Anita and Malcolm have been on a few Mediterranean cruises and were fascinated by places such as Pisa and Rome especially. More recently their son-in-law has accompanied Malcolm on short breaks to Scotland, York, and the Isle of Wight. Meanwhile Anita's sister comes to stay with her for a mini break.

Thank you both for sharing your laughter, love and life together with me.

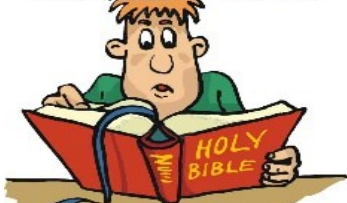
WADARS ENTHUSIASTS!
